Bible Story: Something to Believe In · Romans 8:38-39 Bottom Line: Live like you believe what God says is true

Memory Verse: "Being confident of this, that he who began a good work in you will carry it on to

completion until the day of Christ Jesus." - Philippians 1:6 NIV $\,$

Life App: Confidence - Living like you believe what God says is true.

Basic Truth: I can trust God no matter what.

Summary: We finish the month with something Paul wrote in Romans 8:38-39. The church in Rome needed some encouragement and Paul delivered. He wrote "Nothing at all can ever separate us from God's love. That's because of what Christ Jesus our Lord has done." God's love gives us the confidence to face anything.

1. Early Arriver Idea

Connect: an activity that invites kids to share with others & build on their understanding

What You Need: Paper; markers

What You Do:

- Ask kids to help you make a list of things that are sticky.
- Interact as a group by prompting kids to tell stories behind the sticky things they mention.
- For example, if they mention chewing gum, ask if they have ever gotten gum stuck to the bottom of their shoe or in their hair. What did they do?

What You Say:

"Some things are sticky and some things are not. Sticky isn't always a bad or yucky thing.

Sometimes it's the best thing ever! [Transition] Let's go to Large Group and learn about something that's the best kind of sticky there is because it never goes away."

Lead your group to the Large Group area.

Bottom Line: Live like you believe what God says is true. "God's word is filled with His promises. When we believe them, we can live with confidence that God will be true to those promises and help us through whatever comes our way."

1. Can't Separate It

[Application Activity]

Connect: an activity that invites kids to share with others & build on their understanding

What You Need: Play-Doh

What You Do:

- Tell kids to partner up.
- Give each kid some Play-Doh. Each kid should have a different color than his partner.
- Ask one partner to shape his dough into a heart to represent God's love for us.
- Tell the other partner to shape his dough into a smiley face to represent a person.
- Invite partners to squish their Play-Doh shapes together, mixing the two colors.
- Divide the mixed dough and let each partner take half. Then challenge them to try and separate their portion back into the original separate colors, which will be impossible.
- After a few minutes have kids place their dough back into the container or bag.
- Tell them to take their dough home as a reminder that, like the mixture of colors, they can never be separated from God's love.

What You Say:

"It is completely impossible to separate the two colors of dough once they're mixed together. It's even harder for us to be separated from God's love. In fact, it's absolutely, positively, beyond-a-doubt impossible. God promises that absolutely nothing can take His love away from you. [Bottom Line] Live like you believe what God says is true by saying thank you to God for His great love. Ready? Thank you, God, for Your love!"

2. Finish Line

[Memory Verse Activity]

Play: an activity that encourages learning through following guidelines & working as a group

What You Need: Bible; white crepe paper; markers; tape

What You Do:

- Open the Bible to Philippians 1:6 and review the memory verse with the kids.
- Give each child a piece of white crepe paper and ask them to write their name in large letters across the middle.
- While kids work, place a line of tape on the floor to create a starting line.
- Ask if the kids have ever watched a runner in a race. Let them share experiences.
- Remind the group that a race always has a starting line where the racers begin and
 a special place called a finish line where they complete or end the race. All the
 racers are doing their best to run well all the way to the finish line.
- Choose one child to stand at the starting line and give his crepe paper finish line to two other kids.
- Ask the two helpers to stand at the other end of the room and each hold an end of the crepe paper at waist height.
- Invite the child at the starting line to lead the others in saying the memory verse together (help them as needed) and then run through his finish line.
- Continue letting kids take turns holding the ends of one another's crepe paper until everyone has had a chance to say the verse and run through their finish line.

What You Say:

[Bottom Line] "Live like you believe what God says is true. The Bible is full of true promises from God. Our memory verse this month, Philippians 1:6, is one of those promises. If you love Jesus, you can be joyful and thankful every day because you know that God will be with you all the way through your life. He has loved you even before the starting line of your life when you were born. And He will keep loving you all the way to the finish line when you die and go to heaven. If you believe that, let me see your biggest smile."

3. Pray and Dismiss

[Prayer Activity]

Reflect: an activity that creates space for personal understanding and application

What You Need: N/A

What You Do:

- Ask kids to press both hands together in a prayer posture. Then lead them in a
 Five-Finger Prayer using each finger as a guide.
- Keep each prayer brief—just a sentence or two—and invite others to pray out loud
 if they are willing.

What You Say:

"One of the best ways to [Bottom Line] live like you believe what God says is true is to talk to God every day. Let's use our hands to remind us of things we can pray about.

"Look at your thumb. Sometimes we give a thumb's-up to say, 'Great job,' or 'Thank you!'
Let's tell God thank you. (Lead kids in a thank-you prayer for God's love and care.)

"Look at your first finger. We use that finger to point at things. Point to the person on your left and say, Bottom Line] 'Live like you believe what God says is true!' (Pause.) Now let's pray for him or her. (Lead kids in asking God to help the person on their left to love and follow God.)

"Look at your middle finger. It's the tallest or biggest finger on your hand. Since God is bigger and stronger than anything, let's tell Him we love Him. (Lead kids in unison, 'We love You, God!')

"Look at your next finger. It's often called a 'ring finger.' People who are married wear a wedding ring on that finger to remind them of the promise they made to love one another. God always keeps His promises. Let's tell God that we believe His promises are true. (Name some of God's promises as you pray, 'God, we believe You love us no matter what. You're always with us. You have a plan for us.')

"Look at your pinky finger. It's the smallest finger on your hand but it's still very important. You are small, too, but you're still very important, and God has a plan for each of you. I'm going to pray for YOU." (Speak each child's name then pray an all-inclusive prayer for the entire group to know, love, obey, and trust God more and more as they grow up.)
