Team Welcomes Kids (Providing Time for Fun Interactions)

Summary: In our final week, we head to Nehemiah 3-4, 6:15-16, and 8:1-17 and read that God helped Nehemiah and the people finish the wall in only 52 days! They were able to celebrate all that God had done for them, not only during those 52 days but also throughout their history as His people. They heard God's word and remembered how God had been faithful to them. They had a lot to be thankful for!

When we realize that God is doing amazing things in our lives, we can't help but give Him thanks. We pray that throughout this month looking at Nehemiah's story, kids will see how God helps them each and every day. We hope they learn to celebrate God's continued work in their lives.

Option 1. Early Arriver Idea

Connect: an activity that invites kids to share with others & build on their understanding

What You Need: Smartphone; "Bricks" Activity Page; crayons; scissors

What You Do:

- As you discuss the coupon books, ask the kids to help you cut out and color the bricks from the "Bricks" Activity Page for the next activity.
- Follow up on the coupon book activity from last week. ASK:
 - o Did you complete all seven tasks? Why or why not?
 - What job was the hardest?
 - Did you stay focused on each task? Did anything distract you?
- If parents texted you any pictures of their children completing their tasks, show them to the group and discuss the activity.
- For any kids who were not here last week, ASK:
 - What kind of jobs do you do around your house?
 - o Do you ever get distracted by something else when you're trying to get a job done?

Option 2. Pin the Brick on the Wall

Move: an activity that increases oxygen in the brain and taps into the energy in the body

What You Need: "Bricks" Activity Page; wall tape; bandanas; scissors

What You Do:

- Cut apart the bricks if you have not already done so.
- Line up the kids about three feet in front of the sticky wall.
- Give each child a paper brick.
- Blindfold the first kid in line, spin him around three times, and then let him walk to the wall and stick his paper brick to it.
- When finished, blindfold to next kid in line and continue play until each child has a turn sticking the brick on the wall.

What You Say:

"Have you ever played a version of this game at a party before? I would guess you've probably never been asked to pin a brick on a wall! But this is a super fun game to play, especially at a celebration like a birthday party. [Transition] Nehemiah certainly had something BIG to celebrate. Let's head to Large Group and see if we can figure out what it was."

GROUPS

1. Word Bubble Praise

[Application Activity]

Create: an activity that explores spiritual ideas through the process of drawing/building/designing

What You Need: "Word Bubbles" Activity Pages; scissors; crayons

What You Do:

- Give each kid a "Word Bubble" to color and cut out. Keep the "Savior" page for yourself.
- As kids are working, explain that their pages contain a word that is true about God and is something we should celebrate.
- Read the words out loud if kids are unsure of what they say.
- When finished, let the kids hold up their words and read them together as a group.
- Go around the circle and read the words again, but this time instruct kids to say the words like a cheer or a chant, and pump their fists in the air.

What You Say:

"Today we've learned to [Bottom Line] look for ways to celebrate what God has done. It's easy to celebrate God for all the wonderful things that are true about Him. God is (point to the word bubbles as you say them) kind, loving, patient, powerful, and good! He is our Creator, our protector, and our friend. God is awesome! But we're not done yet! God also sent Jesus to be our Savior! (Hold up the "Savior" word bubble). He showed initiative when he chose to send Jesus to give his life on the cross. Three days later Jesus rose again and proved that nothing could separate us from Him. That is certainly something to celebrate! I'm so thankful we don't have to search very hard to [Bottom Line] look for ways to celebrate what God has done."

3. Pray & Dismiss

[Prayer Activity]

Reflect: an activity that creates space for personal understanding & application

What You Need: "Word Bubbles" from the Application Activity

What You Do:

- Encourage the kids to hold up their "Word Bubbles" as you pray together.
- Explain that you when point to them during the prayer, they will say the word on their bubble.

What You Say:

"Dear God, thank You for being (point to each word bubble as the kids repeat the characteristics of God). Thank you most of all for sending Jesus to be our (hold up the 'Savior' word bubble) Savior! We want to look for ways to celebrate what You have done everywhere we go! In Jesus' name we pray, amen."

As adults arrive to pick up, encourage kids to hold up their word bubble and talk about how it is a characteristic of God and something to celebrate. Encourage your kids to continue to show initiative and to celebrate God for who He is and all He's done this week.
