

WEEK TWO – DECEMBER 2018 – KINDER/FIRST

Bible Story: Someone Like You • Luke 1:26–56 (Supporting: Luke 1:5–25)
Bottom Line: God can use anyone to meet others' needs.
Memory Verse: "God so loved the world that He gave His one and only Son. Anyone who believes in Him will not die, but will have eternal life." John 3:16(NIrV)
Life App: Compassion – Caring enough to do something about someone else's need
Basic Truth: I can trust God no matter what.

Summary: Next, we look at Luke 1:26–56, when Gabriel came and made a huge announcement to Mary. God was about to rescue the world through Jesus, and she had an important role to play. Mary was overwhelmed by God's love for the world and the part she got to play by fulfilling God's plan to send a Savior.

1. Early Arriver Idea

Play: an activity that encourages learning through following guidelines & working as a group

What You Need: Dry Erase Board; marker

What You Do:

- Lead kids in a game similar to Pictionary[®], guiding volunteers to draw various people who may help them, such as their mom or dad, bus driver, teacher, doctor, or firefighter.
- Feel free to provide clues as necessary.
- If time remains, invite kids to name other people who meet their needs during a day: cafeteria workers, custodians, brothers and sisters, grandparents, store clerks, librarians, etc.

2. Who?

Connect: an activity that invites kids to share with others and build on their understanding

What You Need: N/A

What You Do:

- Lead kids in a game similar to "Guess Who?" where you'll use real people.
- Guide kids to stand in a circle.
- Secretly select one child to be your "mystery" child.
- Invite kids to identify who you chose by asking a series of yes-or-no questions, such as: "Is the person you chose wearing tennis shoes? Is the person you chose wearing boots? Is the person you chose wearing red? Is the person you chose a girl?"
- If anyone standing does not qualify based on the yes-or-no questions ask him/her to sit down in order to eliminate options.
- When kids correctly guess the "mystery" child, begin the game again.

What You Say:

"In our Bible story today, we'll hear how God chose someone for a very special reason. [Transition] Let's go to Large Group to find out who God's mystery person was."

Lead your group to the Large Group area.

OVERVIEW:

Bottom Line: *God can use anyone to meet others' needs.* For whatever reason, kids may feel like God can't use them to show others His love. We hope they see through the story of Mary, that God can use anyone to show His compassion to the world.

1. Angel!

[Bible Story Review]

Create: an activity that explores spiritual ideas through the process of drawing/building/designing

What You Need: Coffee filters; markers; clothespins

What You Do:

- Give each child a coffee filter, and set out the markers.
- Guide kids to trace their hands onto the filters. They can trace them in whatever ways and as many times as they choose. (Provide hand-over-hand assistance as needed.)
- Finally, give each child a clothespin.
- Show kids how to scrunch their coffee filters in the middles and insert them into the clothespins. (Again, provide help as needed.)

What You Say:

"When God sent the angel Gabriel to Mary, Mary heard a VERY special message. She heard that God wanted to use HER to help meet the world's greatest need—the need for a Savior!

"This week, let your angels and handprints remind you that God can use YOU to meet other's needs, too. What are some ways that God could use you to meet others' needs? (I can help my little brother get dressed, I can invite someone who's lonely to play with me, I can help clean my classroom, I can help make cookies to give away, etc.) Great ideas! So remember, **[Bottom Line] God can use anyone to meet others' needs**. And that means He can use you!"

2. Anyone

[Memory Verse Activity]

Imagine: an activity that promotes empathy & facilitates biblical application through reenactment

What You Need: Bible; "Rebus Verse" Activity Pages; markers/crayons

What You Do:

- Give each kid an Activity Page, and then invite a child to open the Bible where marked.
- Guide kids to point to the pictures as you "read" the verse together.
- Unpack the word "anyone," emphasizing that it truly means ANYONE—young or old, boy or girl, rich or poor!
- Guide kids to point to the outline of the person.
- Invite them to color the figure either like themselves or like someone they know who needs to believe in Jesus. As they color, again emphasize that anyone who believes in Jesus will live forever with God.

What You Say:

"God loved the world SO MUCH that He sent His own Son to be born on earth. He did it so that ANYONE who believes in Jesus can live forever with God.

"Who do you know that needs to hear about Jesus? (Pause.) Knowing Jesus is the greatest need that everyone has. And you know what? God can use you to help meet that need by telling others about Him.

"So how can you tell others about Jesus? (I can share my Bible storybook with them, I can invite them to church, I can be kind to them like Jesus would, etc.) Great ideas! So always remember that **[Bottom Line] God can use anyone to meet others' needs**—including you!"

3. Pray and Dismiss

[Prayer Activity]

Imagine: an activity that promotes empathy & facilitates biblical application through reenactment

What You Need: "The Greatest Need" Activity Page

What You Do:

- Show "The Greatest Need" card to each child.
- Invite kids to tell what the child needs (presents, a hug, a friend, Jesus, etc.), and then suggest ways they could meet those needs.
- Make sure kids understand they can help meet others' needs without money. They can draw pictures or make cards or be a friend by playing with someone who is sad.
- Use the conversation below to lead kids into prayer

What You Say:

"You may feel like God can't use you to show others His love. But no matter who you are, God can use you. Just think of some of the people in the Bible who God used. There was Moses. He wasn't very good at talking, but God used him to lead the Israelites out of slavery. And David, remember him? He was only a shepherd boy when God picked him to defeat a giant and become king of a nation. And then there's Mary. God chose her out of everyone in the whole world to be Jesus' mom!

"And you know what? God can use you, too, because **[Bottom Line] God can use anyone to** meet others' needs. Let's pray."

Lead kids in prayer, thanking God that He can use anyone to meet others' needs and asking Him to help you and the kids meet others' needs this week.

As adults arrive to pick up, encourage kids to tell their parents today's Bottom Line: [Bottom Line] God can use anyone to meet others' needs. Also, hand out the weekly Parent Cue card.
